

DNB: Joanna Baillie, Scottish dramatist and poetess.

Matthew Baillie, 1761 - 1823, morbid anatomist. Studied medicine in London under Dr. William Hunter. Physician to George III. Bust and inscription in Westminster Abbey.

William Hunter, 1718 - 83, anatomist. Physician to Queen Charlotte. His museum acquired by Glasgow University.

John Hunter, 1728 - 93, surgeon and anatomist. Surgeon to George III. Taught Jenner. Buried in Westminster Abbey. His collections bought by the nation and acquired by the College of Surgeons; annual Hunterian Oration named after him.

The long-lived Baillie ladies came to Bolton House in 1791 and stayed until their deaths.

Joanna's Plays of the Passion (1793) were a sensational success and praised by Byron, Walter Scott, etc. She was the most famous woman dramatist of her time.

Her house was plaqueed by the R.S.A. in 1900.
