Clandestine Marriages; to preventing whereof for the future, be  
it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the  
Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and  
Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority  
whereof, after the Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year of  
our Lord One thousand seven hundred and fifty four,  
all Banns of Matrimony shall be published in an audible manner at  
6 C. 2. Banns.

Scanner in the Parish Church, or in some Publick Chapel, in which Publick Banns of Matrimony have been usually published, or of belonging to such Parish or Chappel wherein the Persons to be married shall dwell, according to the Forme of Wards prescribed by the Rubric nextre to the Office of Matrimony in the Book of Common Prayer, upon three Sundays preceeding the Solemnization of Marriage, during the Time of Morning Service, or of Evening Service, (if there be no Morning Service in such Church or Chapel) upon any of those Sundays immediately after the Second Lesson: And wheresover it shall happen that the Persons to be married shall dwell in divers Parishes or Chappelies, the Banns last in like manner be published in the Church or Chapel, belonging to such Parish or Chappel wherein each of the said Persons shall dwell; and where both or either of the said Persons shall dwell in any Extraparochial Place (having no Church or Chapel wherein Banns have been usually published) then the Banns shall in like manner be published in the Parish Church or Chapel belonging to some Parish or Chappel, adiung to such Extraparochial Place: And where Banns shall be published in any Church or Chapel belonging to any Parish adjoining to such Extraparochial Place, the Parson, Clerk, Minister, or Curate, publishing such Banns, shall, by Writing under his Hand, certify the Publication thereof, in such Scanner as if either of the Persons to be married dwelt in such adjoining Parish; and that all over the Rules prescribed by the said Rubric concerning the Publication of Banns, and the Solemnization of Matrimony, and not hereby altered, shall be duly observed; and that in all Cases where Banns shall have been published the Marriage shall be solemnized in one of the Parish Churches or Chappels where such Banns have been published, and in no other Place whatsoeuer.

Provided always, &c it is hereby further enacted, That no Parson, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, shall be obliged to publish the Banns of Matrimony between any Persons whatsoever, unless the Persons to be married shall, Seven Days at least before the Time required for the first Publication of such Banns, respectively, deliver, or cause to be delivered, to such Parson, Vicar, Minister, or Curate, Notice in Writing of their true Christian and Surnames, and of the House or Houses in their respective Abodes within such Parish, Chancery, or

Extraparochial Place as aforesaid, and of the Time during which they have dwelt, inhabited, or lodged in such House or Houses respectively.

Pounded always, and be it enacted by the Authority  
aforesaid, That no Parson, Minister, Vicar, or Curate,  
solemnizing Marriages after the Twenty fifth Day  
of March, One thousand seven hundred and fifty four, be-  
tween Persons, both of One of whom shall be under the  
Age of Twenty one Years, after Banis published, shall  
be punishable by Ecclesiastical Centuries for solemnizing  
such Marriages without Consent of Parents or Guar-  
dians, whose Consent is required by Law, unless such  
Parson, Minister, Vicar, or Curate, shall have Rec-  
ognition of the Dilence of such Parents or Guardians; and  
in case such Parents or Guardians, or One of them, shall  
openly and publicly declare, in cause to be declared, in the  
Church or Chapel, where he Banis shall be to pub-  
lished, at the Time of such Publication, his, her, or their  
Dissent to such Marriage, the Publication of Banis  
shall be absolutely void.

And it is hereby further encreas'd, That no Licence of Marriage shall, from and after the said Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year One thousand seven hundred and forty four, be granted by any Archishop, Bishop, or other Ordinary, or Person having Authority to grant such Licences, to solemnize any Marriage in any other Church or Chapel, than in the Parish Church or Publick Chapel of or belonging to the Parish or Chapel, within which the usual Place of Abode of the Persons to be married shall have been for the space of Four Weeks immediately before the granting of such Licence; or where both, or either of the Parties to be married shall dwell in any Extraparochial Place, having no Church or Chapel wherein Banns have been usually published, then in the Parish Church or Chapel belonging to some Parish or Chapelry adjoining to such Extraparochial Place, and in no other Place whatsoever.

Provided always, and be it enacted by the Authority  
aforesaid, That all Parishes, wherefore shall be no Pa-  
rish Church or Chapel belonging thereto, or none wherein  
Divine Service shall be usually celebrated every Sunday,  
may be deemed Extraterritorial Places for the Purposes of  
this Act, but not for any other Purpose.

Provided always, That nothing herein before contained shall be construed to extend to deprive the Archbishop of Canterbury and his Successors, and their proper Officers, of the Right which hath heretofore been used, in such cases.

were published; or where the marriage is by Licence, it shall  
not be necessary to give any Proof that the usual Place of  
Abode of One of the Parties for the Space of Four Weeks  
as aforesaid, was in the Parish or Chapel where the Mar  
riage was solemnized; nor shall any Evidence in either  
of the said Cases be received to prove the contrary in any  
Suit touching the Validity of such Marriage.

And whereas many Persons do solemnize Matrimony  
in Villages and other Places without Publication of  
Banns, or Licence of Marriage first had and obtained;  
Wherefore, by the Direction thereof, he it enacted, That  
if any Person shall, first and after the said Twenty fifth  
Day of March, in the year One thousand seven hundred  
and fifty four, solemnize Matrimony in any other Place  
than a Church or Public Chapel, where Banns have been  
usually published, unless by special Licence from the Arch  
bishop of Canterbury, or shall solemnize Matrimony without  
Publication of Banns, unless Licence of Marriage  
be first had and obtained from some Person or Persons  
having Authority to grant the same, every Person knowingly  
and wilfully offending, and being lawfully convicted  
thereof, shall be deemed and adjudged to be guilty of  
Felony, and shall be transported to some of his Ma  
jesty's Plantations in America, for the Space of fourteen  
Years, according to Law in Force for Transportation  
of Felons; and all Marriages solemnized from and after  
the Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year One thousand  
seven hundred and fifty four, in any other Place  
than a Church or Public Chapel, unless by Special  
Licence as aforesaid, or that shall be solemnized without

legally appointed, of One of them; and in case there  
shall be no such Guardian or Guardian, then of the spo  
use (if living and unmarried) or if there shall be no

And it is hereby further enacted, That in no Ecclesiastical Court, in order to compel a Celebration of any Marriage in facie Ecclesiae, by reason of any Contract of Matrimony whatsoever, whether per verba de presenti, or per verba defuncto, which shall be entered into after the Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year One thousand seven hundred and fifty four; any Law or Usage to contrary notwithstanding.

And for preventing undue Entries and Abuses in Registers of Marriages; it is enacted, That by the Authority aforesaid, That on or before the Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year One thousand seven hundred and fifty four, and from thence to time afterwards there shall be Decrees, the Churchwardens and Chapelwardens of every Parish or Chapel, shall provide proper Books of Marriages and Banns of Marriage respectively, there published or solemnized shall be registered, and every Page thereof shall be marked at the Top, with the Figure of the Number; every such Page, beginning at the Second Leaf with Number One; and every Leaf or Page to number shall be ruled with Lines at proper and equal Distances from each other, or as near as may be; and all New Marriages published or celebrated in any Chapel or Chapel, or within any such Parish or Chapel; or within any such Register, printed, or written on, or as near as conveniently may be, to such ruled Lines, and shall be signed by the Parson, Vicar, Minister, Curate, or by some other Person in his Vicarage and by his Direction; and such Entries shall be made aforesaid, on or near such Lines in successive Order, till the Paper is not damaged or decayed by Accidents Length of Time, until a new Book shall be thou proper or necessary to be provided for the same Purposes, and then the Directions aforesaid shall be observed in every such new Book; and all Books provided aforesaid, shall be deemed to belong to the said Parish, and to be kept for publick Use.

And in order to preserve the Evidence of Marriages, and for the Direction of Ministers in the Celebration of Marriages and registering thereof, be it enacted, That from and after the Twenty fifth Day of March, in the year One thousand seven hundred and fifty four, all Marriages shall be solemnized in the Presence of Two or more Clergymen, before the Minister who shall celebrate the same; and that immediately after the Celebration of every Marriage, an Entry thereof shall be made in such Register to be kept as aforesaid; in which Entry or Register it shall be expeditely set forth the said Marriage as celebrated by Banns or Licence; and if both or either of the Parties married by Licence, be under Age, with Consent of the Parents or Guardians, as the Case shall be; and shall be signed by the Smaller with his proper and Filled by Addition, and also by the Party married, and attested by such Two Clergymen; which Entry shall be made in Writing, in the Form of to the Effect following: that is to say,

or felling therein, or of forging &c, any Licence, or of publishing the same, knowing such Licence to be forged, or counterfeited, or issued in false making, altering, forging, or counterfeiting any such Licence of Marriage as aforesaid; or utter or publish as true any such false, altered, forged, or counterfeited Licence as aforesaid, or a Copy thereof, or any such false, altered, forged, or counterfeited Licence of Marriage, knowing such Register or Licence of Marriage respectively, to be false, altered, forged, or counterfeited; or if any Person shall, from and after the said Twenty fifth Day of March, wilfully destroy, or cause or procure to be destroyed, any Register Book of Marriages, or any Part of such Register Book, with Intent to avoid any Marriage, or to subject any Person to any of the Penalties of this Act, any Person so offending, and being thereof lawfully convicted, shall be deemed and adjudged to be guilty of Felony and shall suffer Death as a Felon, without Benefit of Clergy.

Provided always, That this Act, or any thing therein contained, shall not extend to the Marriages of any of the Royal Family.

Provided likewise, That nothing in this Act contained shall extend to that part of Great Britain called Scotland, nor to any Marriage amongst the People called Quakers, or amongst the Persons professing the Jewish Religion, where both the Parties to any such Marriage shall be of the People called Quakers, or Persons professing the Jewish Religion respectively, nor to any Marriages solemnized by the Seas.

This Act is to be read in all Parish Churches and Publick Chays, by the Parson, Vicar, Minister, or Curate of the respective Parishes or Chapelties, on some Sunday immediately after Morning Prayer, or immediately after Evening Prayer, if there shall be no Morning Service on that Day, in each of the Months of September, October, November, and December, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and fifty three, and afterwards at (if same Times, on four several Sundays in each year (it is to say) The Sundays next before the Twenty fifth Day of March, Twenty fourth Day of June, Twenty fifth Day of September, and Twenty fifth Day of December respectively, for Two years, to be computed from and immediately after the Fifth Day of January, in the said Year One thousand seven hundred and fifty four.
