and unoccupied, the Poor People would
have a sufficient sum for the maintenance
of a Minister, I cannot help strongly urging upon
the more opulent Subscribers of Eastgate, to
vote the sum necessary of such a plan; and
I would request the Trustees to consider the
expediency of erecting the same before those
who may be likely to take an interest in proceeding
for the religious construction of their poor, address
A Resolution of the whole meeting a New
Chapel may without be desired from the Proprietary
Body to the Building and Equipping of another
and Chapel, and intend a great deal of expense
would probably be made towards an eventual
enlargement. — If there is no chance of a
New Chapel, I would then strongly urge an
effort to raise the sum necessary for the more
extensive alteration proposed by Mr. Walling.
The Proprietors will then since their money

of the Hampstead Church Act — The Committee
appointed to consider and report upon the
practicability of making a better approach

to the Church from the High Street having taken
into consideration the plans submitted for
making a Carriage Road from Church Row into
the High Street and the probable expence of carrying
the same into execution are of opinion that such a
desirable object cannot be accomplished by the
Trustees inasmuch as the expence will considerably
exceed in amount the sum authorized to be raised
for the repairs or enlargement of the Church and
for all the other purposes of the Act and no specific
proposal having been received (as was expected)
from an individual undertaking to accomplish
such object with the assistance of the Board your
Committee are of opinion that the project must
necessarily be abandoned by the Trustees Your
Committee however beg to recommend that the
vacant ground on the South side of Peacock Court,
which is now offered to be let on building Leases
with the Wooden House at the West End thereof the
value of the freehold of the House and Land being
estimated upon a rough calculation at £700-0-0
or thereabouts to be purchased by the Trustees for the
purpose of affording a more commodious pathway to
the Church and of preventing a number of small houses
from being erected on the site which would be highly
injurious to the Parish at large and more particularly
to the inhabitants of Church Row and your Committee
beg to suggest as the most eligible mode of carrying
the same into effect that a voluntary contribution
be entered into for the purchase of the same according
to the 52^d Section of the Act of Parliament dated
this 12th day of June 1830 — Thos. Sheppard,
Henry White John Looch Geo Proctor

Moved That in the opinion of this Board it is expedient
to purchase the House and Vacant Ground in

Precious Court for the purpose of improving the Approach to the Church and that it be referred back to the said Committee to procure from Mr. Walling a Plan of the Precious proposed to be wrought and a detailed Estimate of the expense of making such improvement in order that the same may be submitted to the Board at a future Meeting and that this Resolution be without prejudice to the consideration of a more enlarged Plan for improving the Approach to the Church should such a Plan be demanded & approved by the Trustees.

The Letter of the Bishop of London was in the Minutes of the last Meeting having been taken into consideration pursuant to Notice
The following Resolutions were proposed by Mr. Shear and seconded by Mr. Southwick three Years having now elapsed since the Act of Parliament was passed empowering the Trustees with consent of the Rector and of the Incorporated Parish and Ordinary to enlarge the Parish Church and various plans having been proposed for such enlargement and one plan which was selected & recommended by the Trustees in the year 1820 having been after a vote rejected by the vestry as being expensive & unnecessary & another Plan for an enlargement upon a smaller scale which has been since approved by the Trustees, being now considered by the Preliminary as requiring too large a votive offering for an addition very inadequate to the wants of the Parishioners and there being at first a diversity of opinion upon the subject amongst the Trustees and the other Inhabitants of the Parish

Resolved

1. That the Trustees are of opinion that it is useless to make any further attempt at present

to effect any enlargement of the Church under the power of this Act of Parliament.

2. That it is incumbent upon the Trustees to proceed forthwith to do the necessary repairs of the Church and to appropriate not less than one half of the whole number of Sittings in it for free & open State pursuant to the directions of the 41st Section of this Act

Resolved

3. That the Architect be directed to prepare a detailed Specification & Estimate of the repairs & alterations mentioned in the last resolution, &c. That as soon as the Architects Report shall be received a Special Meeting of the Trustees be called for proceeding therein

That these Resolutions together with the Bishop of London's Letter dated 15th May 1830 be printed & circulated amongst the Inhabitants accompanied by an earnest Recommendation from the Trustees to consider the subject of building a new Chapel so strongly pressed by his Lordship upon their attention.

The first prepared agreeably to the suggestion of Mr. White provided 123 additional free settings on benches owing for that purpose 28 Pews consisting partly of Windsor Pews in the Body and galleries of the Church at present occupied by Servants & partly of the back Rows of the Pewter Pews in the North & South galleries making the total Number of free Settings as follows -

The second Plan designed by Mr. Hallaway provided 282 additional free Settings on benches with backs similar to those used in the New Churches built under the direction of the Church Commissioners by removing 28 Pews at the West end of the body of the Church consisting partly of double & single Pews occupied by families and partly of free pews occupied by the Poor in the Workhouse Servants & others making the total number of free Settings as follows

A Report from Mr. Sullivan accompanied
with two Plans for obtaining increased accommodation
in Free Sittings prepared under the direction
of Mr. White. Mr. Sheppard and Mr. Simpson are
presented Board and such Report was Ordered
to be entered on the Minutes.

Report of an examination of Hampstead Church
with a view to the accommodation of a greater
number of Persons altogether. & also to the
accommodation of a greater number of persons
in Free Sittings given at the Revd C. H. Simpson,
Mr. Sheppard, Mr. White, Mr. Toller and the
Architect Mr. Sullivan.

The gallery

It was proposed by Mr. Sheppard to alter the
Ceiling either partially or wholly of the last
Bay or division near the West End of the Church
and form a light Gallery which it is calculated
would hold two thirds of the Children. The space
which the Children now occupy to be appropriated
to Free Sittings on open Benches which would
accommodate about 62 Adults. — See Plan
A with the above drawn upon it.

Mr. White proposed building out a projection
at the West end of the Church, the lower part of
which would serve as a Porch & above as a
recept for the Organ. The space now occupied
by the Organ ^{will} then be filled up with Sittings
on open Benches & would accommodate 10
Persons additional. — See Plan B.

It was suggested and approved by all the
Parties present that the back Row of Pews &
two Window Pews (in the Gallery) must be
removed and two rows of regular Free Sittings
on Benches with open backs & the rear row
raised 9 inches might be formed along each

Sides leaving a passage between them & the Pews. This would accommodate 156 Persons in Five Sittings instead of 144 persons in Pew 496 feet which is the present number accommodated - See Plan B.

Ground Floor

It was suggested by the Rev'd Dr. G. Linton that the width of the centre aisle might be increased by diminishing the size of the Pews on each side making them width 8 instead of 10 Persons. Open Benches with Backs & Paneling Boards to hold 3 persons each would then be placed down the Centre of the Aisle leaving a passage on each side to the Pew & at the same time the Pulpit &c might be fixed in the centre. If Five Sittings would be added by this alteration & 24 Sittings in Pews taken away - See Plan C.

The result of my own opinion upon the examination of the Church & consideration of the several Plans proposed, is^t that the introducing an addition to a Gallery at the West End would be ineffectual, as the space is not sufficient nor is there height enough to do so without crowding the Pewm together in a manner highly inconvenient & prejudicial in addition to which, that it would interfere with the interior of the Church in so great a degree as to be very objectionable on that head. But if done at all the least objectionable mode would be to remove entirely the present ceiling of the east division near the West End & form a flat Ceiling as elevated as the Roof of the Church will admit. It should be observed that this alteration inconveniences a mighty & expensive as it would be would not accommodate

more than two thirds of the present number of Children - 2^d Building out a Porch below & Pews above for the Organ would be an expensive alteration in proportion to the New Seating to be obtained thereby - Note. The more extensive the addition supporting the size of the present Chapel to be increased by building on to it the more economical it will be that is a greater number of persons will be accommodated at proportionably less cost or in other words at less per Head. Therefore of a greater addition were to be made it would be better worth while though still very costly if less than the addition of an entire Aisle as originally proposed.

The alteration of the back row of Pews in the Gallery & making a new row of Five Seats in lieu of them &c. as before described appears to me quite unobjectionable & would be very little expense.

Ground Floor

The alterations of the central aisle placing Five Seats thereon appear to me very justiciable & being agreeable to the practice & rules of the Church Commissioners would probably be approved by the Bishop. In addition to this alteration there is no need of the Seats at the West End removing the Seats which were placed in such a manner that the persons on them have their backs to the Pulpit & having them all facing the Pulpit on a raised floor with sloping open backs between the Seats.

The total of the alterations here recommended would be to recommendable.

Inhabitants of this Parish with convenient accommodation
for a Meeting House to be empowered to purchase
any Lands, Freeholds and Hereditaments in or near
the Parish Court in this Parish which may be necessary
for the purpose of making a more convenient approach
to the Church and that the said Trustees be empowered
to borrow or raise at Interest upon the Credit of the

Poor Rates and of the Pew Rents and other monies recoverable by the Parish under the Authority of the said Act by way of Mortgage or otherwise a sum or sum of Money not exceeding in the whole £1000 in order to purchase any such property and to give Compensation to the several persons interested therein for their respective Estates and Interests and for defraying the expences to be incurred in making improvements and for other necessary expence.

The Clerks also reported that Mr Shrimayor Merton had sent the Revd Mr White the Vicarant had in his handwriting directed that in addition to the purchase of any property necessary for making such improvements he sent last the sum of £1000 to the Vicar of London in answer to an application made to him for his Vicarant had sent the following to the Clerks 24 June 1831. Sir, Before I give my consent to the creation of £1000 by the Parishes of Newgate Church, for the improvement of the approach to the said Church to be informed what steps the Parishes have taken, or intend to take, for the improvement of the character of, and object the great importance which is to be thoroughly well by them when I inspected the building last year. I am afraid that the expenditure going a sum as £1000 upon an object of less than great importance, will have the effect of setting further expense than the repair of the Church, which was the principal end for which the Vicar and Vicarant were placed - I am in Your obedt^t friend & Comr^r Mr C. E. Lowton - Thos. St. Loe Esq^r

The Plan proposed by Mr Beaumont at a Meeting held on the 12th of April last for converting into free Sittings several of the Pews at the West End of the Body of the Church having been objected to & withdrawn. It was moved by Mr Shippard and seconded by

Resolved

1. To make the following arrangements for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the 4th Sect^t of the Act for the appropriation of free Sittings viz.
To appropriate the West Gallery to free Sittings for the Parochians generally.
2. To throw open the back Seats in the North and South Galleries.
3. To erect additional Galleries of two in height over the West Gallery or part thereof
By which means free Sittings will be acquired equal to one half of the whole number of Sittings in the Church or their parts as required by the Act.

And that such arrangement will be recommended for adoption by the several parties whose consent is necessary for the execution thereof.

Resolved

That Thomas Shippard Charles Holford and Richard Heathfield Esquires and Mr Beaumont Churchwarden be appointed a Committee to carry into effect the foregoing Resolution and to confer with the Bishop of London thereon and with the Rector and Incumbent and with power to obtain if necessary a Specification and Estimate of the Expence of the proposed Alteration of the Church and of the General Repair and that such Committee be required to confer with the Bishop of London upon the subject of his Lordships Letter entered on the Minutes of this Meeting and to apply for his Lordships Consent to the carrying of the proposed Improvement.

Bills for Salaries to Officers for repairing and other incidental expenses amounting in the whole to £146-11-10 were presented and ordered for payment.

Resolved

The Treasurer's Account of Receipts & Payments from July 1830 to July 1831 has examined whereby it appears that the balance is now amounted to £32-15-5.

At a Special Meeting of the Trustees of the Church convened by direction of the Churchwardens for the purpose of carrying into execution the before mentioned Act, held at the Committee Room in Hampstead Workhouse on Wednesday the 27th of July 1831 at half past Nine o'clock in the forenoon.

Thomas Shippard Esqre was elected Chairman. The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and signed by the Chairman.

The Committee appointed at the last Meeting reported that pursuant to the request of the Board they had had an interview with the Lord Bishop of London and had submitted to his Lordship the Plan for providing the requisite number of sittings by the erection of a additional galleries for the Stalls and by other interior alterations approved of at the last Meeting and that the Bishop had referred his Board to the Plan upon the ground of its not providing that increased accommodation which the population of the Parish required. That his Lordship then proposed to see some Plan of enlargement proposed more agreeable to the spirit of the Act of Parliament and upon the Committee representing to his Lordship that the Vestry might properly consent to an enlargement at the West End to the extent of 20 feet giving 263 additional Sittings (viz: 259 free and 24 pewed Sittings) sat on

revenue of about £2000 including two additional
Chairmen to the Ward Gallery but exclusive of repairs
according to a Plan agreed to be adopted by the Synod
in July 1829 but objected to by his Lordship's interference.
The Bishop stated that he was not conscious of having
given a purchase referred to that Plan and requested
that it might be referred brought forward by the Friends
on the understanding that his Lordship may give to
it his consent and approbation.

(The Committee also requested that they had
consulted with the Bishop of Linton upon the subject
of the conveyance to be given to be made to the
Friends of the Church and that his Lordship gave
his consent and approbation to such arrangement
being adopted and to the purchase of any property which
might be required for those purposes.)

Resolved unanimously
That the said arrangement agreed to by the
Synod at a meeting held on the 27th of July 1829
and now approved of by the Lord Bishop of Linton
is ratified by the Friends subject to any revision
thereon to which may be found essential.

W^t H^r White the Incumbent being present
signified his consent to and approbation of such Plan
of Management.

commissioners to interfere with the trustees upon any minor

one of them is directed to wait upon Sir Thomas G.
Wilson Esq^r the Attorney for the purpose of obtaining his

consent and approbation of such Plan of Management
Also that it be referred to such Committee to ascertain the
fair compensation to be made to the Owners & Trustees of
the freehold House and Ground in Peasey Court belonging
to D^r Poole with full power to offer such Compensation
to the several persons interested therein and to wait for
the payment of such property.

A Letter was read from Dr. Phillips stating that he
had no objection to selling his house his Leathold
Premises in Peasey Court ad interim to Poole's ground
and that he submitted the same to the consideration of
the Friends previous to his entering into any other arrangement.

which occurs to me to suggest, are the removing the
back row of Pews in the Gallery, and forming two
Rows of Free Seats instead of one. According to
one of the former plans which I once made by the
desire of the Trustees, and the removing the
Pulpit into the Centre of the Chapel, or the separating
the Pulpit and reading desk and placing them
of equal height one on each side the centre aisle.

With regard to the sum necessary for the execution
of the addition at the West End, and the repairs
and alterations contemplated for the Church, I
estimate say on a rough calculation they would come
to £3000 probably to £3500. As the making
a detailed estimate would be an additional
expence it will perhaps be unnecessary to go
further into the subject in the present stage of
the business; but when it is finally determined
what shall be done and when the work is to be
executed, I will then, if the Trustees should
wish it, prepare the necessary calculations
