Bishop of London to the proposed partial revision of the pew rents which was as follows:

In accordance with an application by the Trustees of the parish church of Saint John Hampstead and in pursuance of the Act of the 7th and 8th George 4th Cap 71 &c. 47. I hereby consent to the re-allocation of such of the rents for the pews or seats in the said Parish Church as are specified in the Schedule hereto.

It was also further resolved, to put up a printed notice in each Gallery to the effect that persons who were not seat holders were urgently requested to subscribe to the offerings towards the expenses of the church which were very heavy.

The Clerk submitted the correspondence between Mr Hayman and himself and stated that Mr Hayman had in the result agreed to the terms of the Trustees

namely, that he should pay for the pews
he occupied at the rate of £300 a year
in the place of £300 a year.

The Clerk read the following letter from
Miss Langmead -

5 Church Row
May 11th 1888

Dear Sir

I again find it impossible to get
Mr Buckle's pew rent without your
assistance - The half year ending 1st November
to 1st Feb 88 £3.16.6 has not been paid
and of course the same amount is now
due for the half year ending mid-December
next. Are the settings to remain in -
Mr Buckle's name if he continues to give
this trouble? His present address is
16 Carlton Road.

There is also sum of £1.4.9 due
from Mr B P Daniels 49 Bayswater Park
for the quarter ending Christmas last.
He gave up his settings at that date -
the previous half year payment was only
obtained after a great deal of trouble
by threatening to place the matter in
your hands.

Will you kindly help me in both these
cases?

The Clerk reported that he had written
two letters to each of the Gentlemen named
by Miss Langmead requesting them to pay

the pews mentioned to, but had received
no reply from either of them.

Resolved

That the Clerk do write another letter
to each of these Gentlemen informing them
that the matter had been brought before
the Trustees & that the Trustees insisted
upon payment being made.

Mr Bell stated that Mr Herbert Parker
had presented a Piscina to the church.

The Rev S B Barnaby almost stated that
Miss Ward had given a donation of £50
which had been applied by him towards
fittings for the church and that Mrs &
Mr Stammers had made a presentation
of a handsome Altar Cloth.

The statement of the salaries and
bills amounting together to £130.0.2
in respect of the quarter ending the
24th June 1888 was submitted by the
Clerk and directed to be paid ab initio
for the several sums were drawn and
signed accordingly.

It was also Resolved that no further steps be taken with the view of obtaining the pew rent due by Mr. Buckler.

Resolved

That the notices as to the reduction

of the rents be also placed on pews No 49 to 56 inclusive & on No 57 & 58 and that notices as to the offertories should be distributed throughout the church.

A letter was read from Mr H.S. Parker in which he urged that seats should be allotted to Lads.

Resolved,

That pews No 124 & 125 be allotted accordingly, and be hired at the pleasure of the Trustees.

The Statement of salaries and bills amounting together to £126. 17. 5 with respect to the quarter ending 25th Dec/88 was submitted and directed to be paid and cheques for the several amounts were drawn & signed accordingly.

It appearing that after payment of the bills & salaries there remained a balance of £126. 3. 8, it was
Resolved,

That cheques be drawn in favor of the Loan Trustees under the Mortgage of the 21st January 1879 for £5. 15. 0 being interest at the rate of 5% on the three remaining certificates of £5. 15 each secured by the before mentioned mortgage Deed, and for £75.— the balance of the principal, in order that the Loan Trustees might take such steps in

conformity with the mortgage Deed for the payment off of the remaining three certificates as ~~will~~ necessary.

A letter was read from Mr James Phillips resigning his seat on the Board.

Resolved,

That Mr James Phillips' resignation be accepted.

Mr Pooley having raised a question as to gravelizing the paths, it was ultimately

Resolved,

That the matter should be referred to the Chairman, Mr Bell, and Mr Pooley to see what could best be done with reference to this matter.

A letter was read from the Clerk with respect to his salary, and to the misunderstanding which had apparently arisen with respect to the amount to which he was entitled, when it was
Resolved,

That the Chairman do write to the Clerk to the effect that his letter had cleared up any doubts which had existed.

Mr Bell having requested authority

for the purchase of some Cocoa matting for the church in place of similar material which was worn out it was resolved that such a purchase be sanctioned.

Letters were read from Mr. Fazey & Mr. G. Blower regretting that they were unable to attend.

At a meeting of the Trustees for carrying into execution an Act for providing the Inhabitants of the parish of Hampstead with increased accommodation for attending Divine Service convened by the direction of the Minister and held at the Vicarage on Thursday the 11th day of April 1889 at 8.30 in the morning present.

The Reverend Thos. Burnet Burnaby & nephews Bell, Cow, Lake and Wild.

The Reverend S. B. Burnaby in the chair.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read and signed by the chairman.

The Statement of Salaries and Bills amounting together to £131.16.6 with respect to the quarter ending the 25th March 1889 was submitted - it appearing that the balance of the Trustees at their Bankers was £90.0.8 leaving £31.15.10, the Chairman stated that the Collector Miss Langmaid had since the books had been made up, forwarded a further Cheque of £20.0. on account of the Pew Rents, and he handed to the Clerk a Cheque for £11.15.10 out of the offertories to make up the deficiency - the accounts were directed to be paid and cheques for the several amounts were drawn & signed accordingly.

11th April 1889

The Clerk read a letter from Mrs Pfleil on behalf of her husband, asking the Trustees to top some of the trees in the churchyard overlooking her husband's garden. The letter was referred to the Clerk with power to act.

The Clerk having stated that all the debts had been paid off & that the debt on the Church was consequently discharged. It was Resolved,

That a cordial vote of thanks be passed to Mr J Moore & Mr E H Jones the two Trustees for the attention & time which they had given to the interests of the Trustees and of this church.

A letter from the Clerk was read, in which he placed with regret his resignation in the hands of the Trustees owing to the fact that the claims upon his professional time were so exacting that he was unable any longer to give the requisite time to the office which he had held for 15 years.

The Trustees having kindly expressed great regret at the resignation of the Clerk & having passed a vote of thanks to him for the service he had rendered, passed to the consideration of the appointment of a Clerk to take Mr Moore's place, when a letter was read from Mr Henry Stark of Downshire Hill applying for the situation, and it was also stated that Mr Bullock the Secretary of the Hampstead Charity Organization Society

11th April 1889

would probably apply and the Chairman stated that Mr Marshall who was a member of the organization would also be willing to take the office.

It was also stated that having regard to the fact that all the business in connection with the restoration of the church had now been completed, the salary of the Clerk probably might not be so much in the future as it had been in the past.

It was ultimately resolved that the matter be referred to the Chairman, Mr Pitt, Mr Wild & Mr G M Potter, a trustee of the Additional Burial Ground, to consider the application for the Office of Clerk and to report thereon to the Trustees, and that they be empowered to advise & report whether any reduction should be made in the salary & emoluments of the Office and power was given to the Committee to invite applications if they thought requisite.

The Chairman stated that he had ascertained that the Organ was used by the pupils of Mr Shaw the organist for the purpose of practice, after dark and that the pupils consequently used the Organ, and that they were in the habit of using the Organ in the absence of the organist & that they obtained the services of any body they chose to select to play the Organ.

The Trustees having expressed themselves

11th April 1889

as strongly opposed to such an improper and unbecoming like mode of proceeding being continued, and the Clerk having stated that some years previously the question had been raised & Mr Shaw had been informed that the Organ must not be used by his pupils after dark and in his absence, it was

Resolved

That a code of rules to govern the use of the organ be drawn up & that the preparation of such rules be referred to Mr Lake, Mr Vicent & Mr Bell. It was suggested that the Committee should in these rules make Mr Shaw responsible for the use of the organ by his pupils, that he should give a list of his pupils to the person who had charge of the keys of the church & that the keys should not be given up to any pupils for practice without a written order from Mr Shaw, that the pupils should not be allowed to practice after dark and that no Organ Blowers but the regular ones should be allowed to blow the organ for the pupils.

It was Resolved

That the Clerk do write at once to Mr Shaw reminding him of the resolution which had been passed by the Trustees some years previously, to the effect that his pupils were not allowed to practice after dark, & that ^{the} Trustees found that rule had been violated, they

felt sure that he (Mr Shaw) must have allowed the rule in question to have escaped his memory, and that the Trustees were about to propose a code of rules to govern the use of the Organ.

the Organ on occasions other than at
the services or choir practices.

Rules to govern the use of the
Organ on other occasions than the
services and choir practices.

1. That the Organist for the time being shall be responsible for the use of the Organ by his pupils.
2. That there be two Keys only of the Organ, one to be kept by the person deputed by the Vicar and the other by the Organist.
3. That the Organist do furnish the Vicar with a list of one of his pupils as he desires shall have the privilege of practising on the Organ, and that he keep the Vicar from time to time informed of any corrections in such list.
That no other person be permitted to use the Organ except with the written authority of the Vicar or one of the Churchwardens.
4. That no person other than the Blowers appointed by the Trustees be employed to blow the Organ and that their names and addresses be posted in the choir vestry.
5. That no practice be allowed on the Organ after 10 p.m. by which hour the gas shall be turned out and the church closed.
6. The Trustees reserve to themselves the

right of withdrawing at any time the
privilege of practising on the Organ and
the right to vary these Rules.

Your Committee also recommend that
these Rules be printed and a copy
posted in the choir vestry, and further
that the Organ Blowers be informed
that they will be held responsible for
the gas being turned out and the
church closed after practice.

Your Committee further recommend
that two additional Blowers be appointed
to be employed as occasion shall require.

The Statement of Salaries and Bills was then submitted and the Chairman pointed out that the Payments amounted to £ 129.5.6 & the Receipts to £ 69.8.2 and explained that this was due to the large number of Pewholders who had got in arrear with their rent and who would doubtless pay the same in the course of a week or so. Further that the Trustees were in the habit of drawing certain sums /viz £ 25 for Mr. Shaw and £ 7.16 for four cleaners/ in advance in order that the Clerk might have the money in hand to pay by instalments. The Chairman proposed that on this occasion they should not draw these sums in advance but should empower Mr. Essex himself to do so as they became due for them the Balance at the Bank

Resolved

to the credit of the Trustees would be larger. He further proposed that they should let the payment ^{of £ 25} to the Hamptead Additional Burial Ground stand over till next quarter. He had drawn a cheque on the offertory etc for £ 25 thus increasing the Receipts to £ 94.8.2 and if the Trustees accepted his proposal the immediate payments would be reduced to £ 83.9.6.

The various items having been examined the Chairman's proposal was carried & cheques to the amount of £ 83.9.6 were drawn and signed accordingly.

The large Gas Bill was due to the necessity of using gas all day while the men were decorating the ceiling of the Church. -

Attention having been drawn to the fact that the Church Clock was not going in a satisfactory manner it was proposed by Mr. Morris seconded by Mr. Wilson & Resolved That the Clerk be instructed to write a letter to Mr. Whittemore to the effect that the Clock having been recently repaired the Trustees are not satisfied with its present performance.

The Vouchers of the Payments for the quarter ended 24 December 1889 were submitted and having been examined were passed.

beg to report that they attended a meeting
at the Vicarage Chapel on Friday the
4th of July 1890 in accordance with a notice
received from the Clerk, convening a meeting
of the Trustees for that day and that
no other Trustees being present they proceeded
with the business of the meeting which was
as follows:

" The statement of Salaries and Bills was submitted. The Salaries proper came to the usual amount viz £ 62.15.- The Bills included the yearly payment for tuning the organ £ 10. Repairs to North Porch and Belfry £ 19.-3 and yearly payment to the Trustees of the Hampstead Additional Burial Ground on account of Gardener Wages of £ 13. The total of Salaries & Bills amounted to £ 144.10.11.
The various items having been examined both the Salaries and Bills were directed to be paid and cheques were drawn and signed accordingly.
The Vouchers of the Payments for the quarter ended March 1890 were examined and passed.
The Chairman then informed the Trustees that Mr. Charles who attended to the furnace and was also one of the organ blowers, had died suddenly and that it was important that someone should be elected in his stead at once. After some consideration it was moved by Mr. Eves and seconded by Mr. Wild Resolved that

The Statement of salaries & Bills for the quarter ending September 1890 was submitted.
The payments amounted to £101.4.11 and the receipts to £80.7.3 including a balance brought forward from last quarter of £15.10.4. The salaries amounted to £63.11.- The Vicar pointed out that the only extraordinary bill was that of Mr. Steers & Painter for £24 which was for taking out the two church bells and changing them so as to cause the clappers to strike in such places with all the alterations in the gear which such a change necessitated

The various items having been examined the Vicar handed the Clerk a cheque for the deficit viz £20.17.8 and the bills and salaries were ordered to be paid and a cheque was drawn and signed accordingly.

The vouchers of the payments for the quarter ended June 1890 were examined & passed. The attention of the meeting was then called to the payment to Mr. Strode for electrical repairs and it was pointed out that every quarter some bill of theirs had to be paid. Mr. Boden after some discussion kindly undertook to examine the Gas piping in order to ascertain whether it was necessary to keep the Battery going for the purpose of lighting the Gas.

The Vicar explained that this was a piece of ground originally bought by the Trustees in order to improve the approach to the Church the greater part of which was sold afterwards to the Metropolitan Board of Works (for the Town Improvements) for £150.
