

THE PARISH CHURCH OF ST JOHN-AT-HAMPSTEAD

REGISTERS AND RECORDS

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The Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials are from 1560 to 1842. Civil Registration began in England in 1837. The Trustees Minute Books are from 1744 to 1934.

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It was moved by Mr. Bell
Seconded by Mr. Kennedy and
Resolved That the actions of the Churchwardens
be approved, and Mr. Hart's bill
amounting to £20-14-6 be paid.

The Churchwardens also reported that
they had compared the Vouchers for
payments made last quarter, with
the Cash Book and found them
correct. They had also examined
the statement of salaries and bills
for the quarter ending Lady Day
last - amounting to £642-0-0.

There was a deficit of £10-18-9
which would be met by a grant
of £20- from the Churchwardens'
account and so leave a balance
in hand of £9-1-3. Cheques for the
required payments were accordingly
drawn and signed.

The Clerk having reported that Mr.
Stayman's few rent due last Michaelmas
was still unpaid - the Trustees instructed
the Clerk to write to Mr. Stayman
and request an early settlement
of the amount.

Attention was drawn to the fact
that one third of the existing Trustees
must retire at Easter 1908. The names
of the retiring Trustees to be determined
by lot.

Mr. Churchwarden Lake suggested that
a brass tablet to the memory of

the Revd S. B. Burnaby be erected in the
Church, the cost of the Brass to be
defrayed by the Trustees.

The Vicar stated that a Faculty would
be necessary.

It was moved by Mr. Lake
Seconded by Mr. Coates and
Resolved That a Tablet to the memory of
the late Vicar be placed in the Church,
subject to a Faculty being obtained,
and that it be left to the Vicar and
Churchwardens to carry out.

The question of raising or revising the
few rents was next discussed.

It was moved by Mr. Lake
Seconded by Mr. Preston and
Resolved That a Committee consisting of
the Churchwardens, Messrs C. H. J. Nutt,
F. Collins, G. Coates, R. C. Crump & H. F. Sooley,
be appointed to consider whether it is
desirable to revise the existing few rents,
to any and what extent.

Mr. Kennedy suggested that Hampstead
Parish Church being an historical
building, it might be interesting to
the Parishioners if the names of former
Vicars of the Parish were inscribed
on a tablet to be placed in the centre
Porch or in some other suitable
position. The expense to be met by
the Parishioners.

The Trustees Resolved unanimously
that a Committee consisting of the

Vicar, Churchwardens and Clergy
E. Bell, S. Collins and J. Kennedy,
be formed to see to the carrying
out of the above suggestion.

At a meeting held at St. John's Mission Hall
this day July 14th 1902. present
the Revd. Brook Deedes, Vicar, in the Chair-
manship E. Bell and C. H. Glynn, Churchwardens,
C. H. J. Acret, E. Bell, J. Coates, S. Collins,
P. G. Craigie, J. Kennedy, C. Preston & H. F. Pooley.

The minutes of the previous meeting
were read and signed by the Chairman.

The Vicar read letters from Mr. Johnson
and Mr. Jane-Claypool regretting their
inability to attend.

Mr. Lake reported that the brass tablet to
the memory of the late Vicar, the Revd. S. B.
Burnaley had been fixed up in the church.
The Churchwardens reported that they
had seen the vouchers for payments made
last quarter and found them correct.
The statement of salaries and bills due
for the quarter ended Midsummer last,
amounting to £16-10-2 had also been
carefully examined, the only item which
called for special remark was the sum
of £16-5-10 due for gas, which shewed
an increase of £7-1-4 on the amount
paid the corresponding quarter of 1901.

After some discussion it was moved by
Mr. Collins and Resolved that the
Churchwardens be asked to have the
gas meter tested when it could conveniently
be done. A deficiency of £31-3-7
was met by a grant of £40 from the
Churchwardens' account, leaving a
balance in hand of £8-16-5.

It was moved by Mr. Glyn, seconded by Mr. Lake and carried unanimously - that the statement of accounts be received and adopted. Cheques for the necessary payments were accordingly drawn and signed.

The Clerk reported that Mr. Hayman had forwarded a cheque for £10 which reduced his arrears of pew rent to £15. Mr. Glyn reported that the Church Plate had been insured against burglary. The Vicar stated that he had asked Mr. Carrington to examine the Plate, and that he had valued the large Cup at £4000 and the Chased Pattern at £250.

Mr. Lake read the Report of the Committee appointed to consider the question of revising the present rate of pew rents.

After considerable discussion it was moved by Mr. Bell

seconded by Major Craigie and Resolved that further consideration of the Report be deferred until the October Meeting - in the meantime the Vicar and Churchwardens to consult as to whether there might not be other means by which the income of the Church could be increased.

The Vicar reported that the interior of the Church required to be thoroughly cleaned & that while the work was being done, the church must be closed. The matter was left in the hands of the Churchwardens.

Convened Oct. 13. 1902 Brook Deedes

At a meeting held at St. John's Mission Hall this day October 13th 1902 - present, the Revd Brooks Deedes, Vicar, in the chair the Revd J. H. Williams, Messrs E. C. Lake and C. H. Glyn, Churchwardens - C. H. J. Heret, E. Bell, E. C. Evans, J. Coates, E. Collins, T. Humphreys, J. Hepburn, J. Kennedy, W. Jane-Clayton, H. G. Portley.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and signed by the Chairman.

Mr. Glyn reported on behalf of the Churchwardens, that he had compared the Vouchers for payments made last Quarter with the cash book and found them in order; he had also examined the statement of salaries and bills for the Quarter ended Michaelmas last, amounting to £109-7-9 and found it correct, the balance in hand was £14-5-1.

Resolved unanimously that the above statement of accounts be received and adopted.

The requisite cheques were accordingly drawn and signed.

The Clerk reported that the balance of Mr. Hayman's arrears £15 was still unpaid, also the half year's pew rent £12-10-0 due last Michaelmas making a total amount of £27-10-0.

It was moved by Mr. Bell and seconded by Mr. Heret and

Resolved unanimously that the Clerk

be instructed to give formal notice to Mr. Haugman, that unless his arrears of premium amounting to £27-10-0 were paid before the expiration of 21 days from the 29th of September last the Trustees would, under the powers of their Act, take possession of the pews now occupied by him with a view to reletting them, and would also take the necessary steps to enforce payment of the debt due.

It was moved by Mr. Lake and
Resolved that the dates for Trustees meetings during the year 1903 be as follows
 2nd Monday in January 2nd Monday in April 2nd Monday in July
 2nd Monday in October.

Mr. Glynn reported that the cost of thoroughly cleaning the church was as follows
 Mr. Hart's Bell £3.5.0
 House's time & materials £5.12.5.
 It was proposed by Mr. Glynn,
 seconded by Mr. Tollius and
Resolved that a further sum of £1
 be paid to the Verger for his
 share in the work done, the
 whole amount £9.17.5 to be paid
 out of the Churchwardens' account.

The consideration of the Report of the Sub-Committee appointed to consider the desirability of revising the existing premiums, adjourned from the last meeting - was resumed.

It was moved by Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Glynn and

Resolved that on fresh lettings the rent of the sittings in pews 3 to 47 inclusive, be raised to 3d/- except in the case of the proprietary sittings.

That for the sittings in the front pews of the North and South Galleries an uniform rent of 2d/- be paid on fresh lettings, instead of the present varying rents, except in the case of the proprietary sittings.

That for the sittings in the 2nd row of these same galleries an uniform rent of 1d/- per sitting be paid on fresh lettings except the proprietary sittings and any seats to be hereafter declared free.

That the 3rd and remaining rows in the same galleries be declared free and unlettable.

It was moved by Mr. Fooley
 seconded by Mr. Bell, and

Resolved that all free seats be so marked.

It was moved by Mr. Bell and carried unanimously that the Report be referred back to the Committee to carry out the above Resolutions and also to consider and report how the deficiency in the number of free seats required by the Act can best be provided.
It was moved by Mr. Lane and Resolved unanimously that the name of Mr. Edward Bell be added to the Sub-committee.

At a Meeting held at S. John's Mission Hall, this day January 12th 1903; present the Revd Brook Deedes, Vicar, in the chair, the Revd F. H. Williams, Messrs. E. E. Lane Churchwarden - E. Bell, E. Collins, J. Hepburn, J. Kennedy, & W. Lane-Claypon.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and signed by the Chairman.

Mr. Lane reported that the Churchwardens had compared the vouchers for payments made last Quarter, with the Cash book and found them correct.

They had also examined the statement of Salaries and bills, amounting to £148-8-11 for the Quarter ending Christmas last.

The per rents paid since Michaelmas were insufficient to defray the necessary expences, but a grant of £25 by the Vicar, from the Parochial Purposes Fund, would enable the Churchwardens to meet the deficiency and would leave a balance in hand of 10/-.

It was moved by Mr. Kennedy seconded by Mr. Lane-Claypon, and Resolved that the statement of accounts be received and adopted - the Cheques required were accordingly signed.

The following further Report of the Sub-Committee appointed to consider and report as to the means by which the necessary number of free sittings could be provided,

was read by Mr Lake, the Chairman.

The sub. Committee was held on Nov. 5^t 1902
in the Vestry of the Parish Church -

present - The Vicar in the Chair

Messrs E. C. Lake & C. H. Glynn - Churchwardens
E. Bell, E. Collins, J. Coates, & H. F. Poole -

After some discussion - It was

Resolved that pews 127 in the East Gallery,
124 & 125 in the South Gallery, 88 & 87 in
the North Gallery - 85 & 86 in the North
Side Aisle and 49 & 50 in the South
Side Aisle should be declared free -
that the Churchwardens arrange for marking
all pews declared free, which with one
exception has since been done, and that
the necessary steps be taken to obtain the
Bishop's consent to the alteration in the
scale of pew rents.

It was moved by Mr Lake

Seconded by Mr Collins and

Resolved that the above Report be received
and adopted.

Mr. Lake reported that the Guardians of
the Poor had in their possession certain papers
relating to various Church Charities,
he had examined the papers, which
would now be handed over to the care
of the Vicar and Churchwardens.

The Vicar again drew the attention of
the Trustees to the very inadequate

accommodation afforded by the present
Choir Vestry, and suggested the desirability
of commencing the new Vestry as soon
as possible.

The Trustees decided that a definite
estimate should be obtained from Mr. Raikes
the Architect, and that the Vicar and as
many of the Trustees as could conveniently
do so - should meet Mr Raikes at the
Church with a view to arriving at some
decision on the subject.

The Vicar reported that he had received a letter
from Mr. Grunts regretting his inability to
attend.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read and
signed by the Chairman.

Mr. Lake reported that the Churchwardens
had vouched the accounts of the previous
Quarter and found them in order.

They had also examined the statement of
Salaries and bills for the Quarter ending
Lady Day last - amounting to £145-15-2.

The pew rents paid in during the current
Quarter were £146-19-0. There was a
balance in hand of £1-14-9.

It was moved by Mr. Lake

Seconded by Mr. Pooley and

Resolved that the above statement of accounts
be received and adopted.

The cheques required for payments were
accordingly drawn and signed.

The Vicar reported that a few of the
Trustees and himself had met Mr. Raikes
at the Church with a view to arriving
at some decision respecting the proposed

enlargement of the Choir Vestry.
They had carefully examined the outside
ground and had ascertained that only
one Coffin would be in the way - but
it need not be disturbed.

The Vicar had asked Mr. Raikes to prepare
an estimate which would include the
cost of the alteration necessary to afford
light and ventilation at the west end
of each Side aisle - the part occupied by
the Sunday School Children - this improvement
could be effected by placing Windows in
the spaces now occupied by two Tablets,
which would be fixed elsewhere.

Mr. Raikes who was present, submitted
to the Trustees a plan of the new Choir
Vestry; he explained that the estimate
had worked out at £800. The high price
was partly due to the fact that the
foundations of the Vestry must be dug
11 feet, an unusual depth. But in
this case necessary to avoid the Coffin
before mentioned, the flooring was also
expensive, it would however be thought
possible to carry out the work for £700.

After discussing the subject at some
length, the Trustees unanimously
Resolved that Mr. Raikes plan, which
would include the necessary flooring,
be adopted.

The Vicar suggested that while money was
so much needed for the repairs and
alterations to the Boys' School, no special

Appeal should be made to the parishioners with regard to the new vestry, but he proposed bringing the subject to their notice through the Annual Report, which would shortly be published, and representing the urgent necessity for the improvement, in any indirect way that might suggest itself.

account was necessary to meet these
payments - which would leave a
balance in hand of £2-0-8.

It was moved by Mr. Lake, seconded
by Mr. Collins and Resolved that

Mr. Lake read a letter from Mr. Hayman
expressing regret that his arrears
of payment still remained unpaid,
and promising that a Cheque should

Basil Champneys, Henry Seace,
Thomas A. Ursich & George Wells were
elected to fill Vacancies in the
number of Church Trustees - caused
by the death of Mr F. S. Monroe, and
the resignation of Messrs A. Stedall,
C. Wrightman & R. Wilson.

The question of repairs needed to the
Furnace boiler was discussed, and
the Trustees decided to leave this
matter in the hands of the Church
wardens and Mr. Collins.

obtained by Mr. Collins, it had not
been found necessary to have
a new boiler. Also that the
attention of the Churchwardens had

been drawn to the condition and variety of the Church hassocks etc. And suggested rules being made to ensure more uniformity in the pew fittings.

It was moved by Mr. Lake, seconded by Mr. Collier and

Resolved that on all new fittings, seat-holders be informed that hassocks and seat & floor coverings must be uniform. And of a pattern to be approved of by the Vicar and Churchwardens. To be obtained through the Clerk.

The Trustees also decided that in future, book boxes should not be fixed in the pews, without the sanction of the Churchwardens.

The question of increasing the Organist's salary was raised by the Vicar -

It was moved by Mr. Kennedy seconded by Mr. Glynn and

Resolved that from Christmas next, Mr. Hattens salary be increased from £115 to £120 per annum.

Mr. Hart's bill of £5-10-0. for work done in the Church was considered and the Trustees passed it subject to examination by the Churchwardens -

The only way to enlarge the Choir Vestry, which is much too small for present requirements, and is extremely damp, is to build it out over a portion of the Churchyard.
The Transepts are urgently in want of day light and more air.

" would do away with the present more or less
" ragged & odd coloured pieces of carpet, and
" would materially help to reduce the dust
