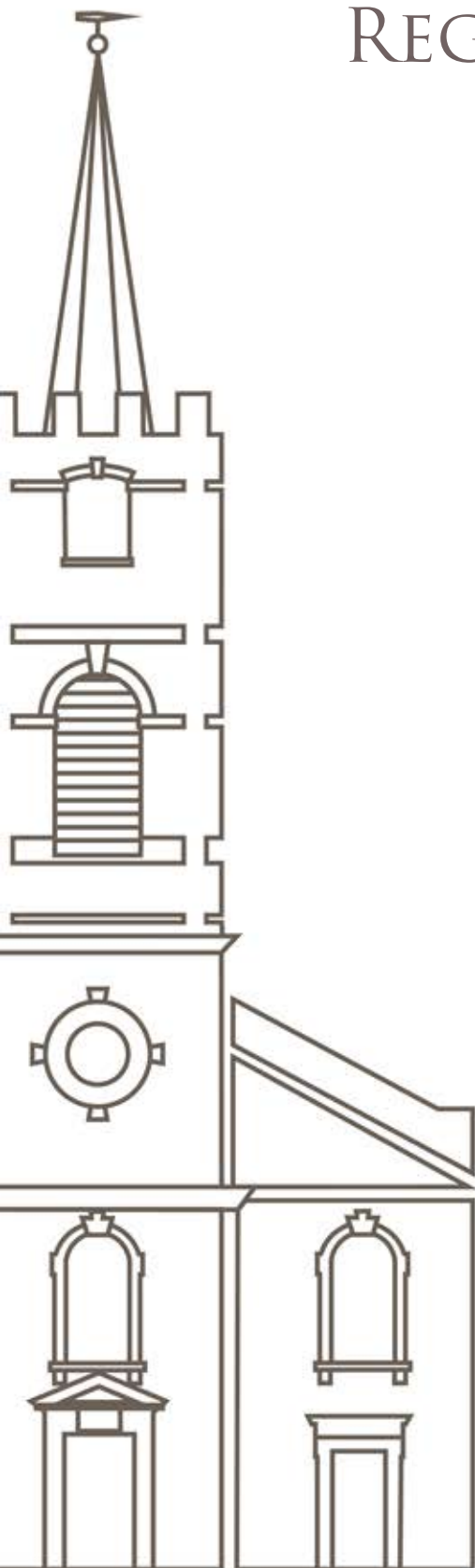


THE PARISH CHURCH OF ST JOHN-AT-HAMPSTEAD

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The Registers of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials are from 1560 to 1842. Civil Registration began in England in 1837. The Trustees Minute Books are from 1744 to 1934.

Mr. Moreland stated that the increase
in the expenditure on the Choir was
accounted for by the fact that the
amount shown for last year was
an estimated one, the correct figure
being £57.

He further stated that the Choir
Master had warned him that he
might want some more paid help
on the men's part.

The increase in the salaries
was for the assistant Organist.

The large increase in the

expenditure on Coke was occasioned by the difficulty in obtaining supplies and 10 tons was paid for in the past quarter instead of in the following quarter as last year.

The cold winter weather accounted for the excess of fuel used.

In the Printing account the extra £40 was for the Report, which amount would be reduced by the amount obtained for advertising.

The Statement was approved.

With regard to the receipts Mr Brown stated that - The amount received this year to date was £982 against £1088 last year, that the £100 down on money actually banked was due partly to the fact that several members of the congregation who had paid by this time last year had been away and had not yet paid.

Of the money banked last year there was however £70 which would not be obtained owing to death & removals but this had been made up by new subscribers.

At least £100 more this year would be required if the intention of making an additional payment of that amount to the Assistant Clergy was to be carried out.

The Report of the Council's Representative on the Information Bureau of the Life and Liberty Movement which was as follows was read:-

The Church Assembly met on November 12th 1923 & following days.

The Metropolitan Churches Measure was considered on the stage of revision. After an interesting debate it was proposed to re-commit the Measure to a Committee of not more than 12 persons. This was agreed to.

General approval was given to the Interpretation Measure providing for the construction and interpretation of Measures passed under the enabling Act and for the application of the Interpretation Act of 1889 to future Measures of the Assembly.

General approval was also given to the House of Laity Representation Regulation providing that the election of the new House of Laity in 1925 shall be on the basis of the Electoral Rolls as revised by the Church Councils in 1924.

The Prayer Book Revision Measure was considered on the stage of Revision. Proposed amendments to omit from the Revision the whole Section relating to the office of Holy Communion were defeated.

The question of two alternative Canons, the Green & the Grey Book, was discussed and it was agreed, after considerable debate, that they should be given general approval with a view to revision at a subsequent Session.

At the Spring Session, held from February 11th to 15th 1924 the chief business was the continuation of the consideration of Prayer Book Revision. The House of Laity passed a Resolution in favour of Reservation of the Blessed Sacrament for the Sick.

The two alternative Canons were accepted with very slight alteration.

A Resolution was passed that the Standing Committee should be authorised to proceed with the consideration of a Scheme for the reconstitution of the Queen Victoria Clergy Fund.

It was moved that the Central Board of Finance be instructed in calling for quotas from the dioceses to make it clear that the money was not required for the augmentation of the Central Church Fund but as revenue to meet expenditure authorised in the Budget passed by the Assembly.

On account of the shortage of

Candidates for the Sacred Ministry it was agreed that the Central Advisory Council should be asked to consider the framing of some scheme of home training for men who are unable to leave their secular employments during the time of preparation.

With regard to the Motion of which notice had been given by Mr. Dykes in the following terms:—

"That the Vicar be requested to arrange for a Sung Eucharist at 11 a.m. on one Sunday in each month so as to give the numerous School children an opportunity to become acquainted with this great act of praise and thanksgiving."

In Mr. Dykes' absence,

It was Resolved that the consideration of the Motion be deferred till the next meeting.

It was Resolved that the cards for Strangers to the Church should be placed in the pews.

It was Resolved that a Report be obtained showing the work of repair necessary to the Organ and the approximate cost.

With reference to the question of the cost of the Chapel referred to in the April Review,

the cost would be between £300 and £350.

The Collections in Church are practically the same as in 1923, i.e. £985 against £988.

The Voluntary Contributions received from Jan. 1 to June 24, 1924, including Pew Rents, are £1307 against £1413 in 1923, and the Subscriptions to Parks collected by the Parochial Treasurer were £130 against £136.

It will be seen from these figures that a total expenditure of £2110 is expected in 1924, which is about £200 more than 1923.

With regard to the Organ.

It was reported that nothing had yet been done, and it was Resolved that the matter should be considered at the next meeting.

The Vicar reported the deaths of Col. Rodick, Mr Ellwood Miss Sewerton, & Mrs Winter Gray, a Teacher at the Parochial Schools.

A letter as to absence was read from Mr Fisher.

Resolved that the Rev. D. C. Rosser be co-opted a member of the Parochial Church Council.

The Quarterly Accounts, a print of which is annexed, were presented & approved.

Mr Moreland explained that it had been arranged that the payment for the Boiler amounting to £120 would be postponed until next year and would accordingly come into next year's Budget, that it was proposed that the additional £100 for the Curates should not be provided out of the Church Funds in the present year but that a collection should be made on Sunday the 2nd November, the proceeds of such collection, whatever they amounted to, to be given to the Curates' Fund and that those proposals would reduce the estimated deficit by £200.

The Report of the sub-Committee with regard to the Organ which was as

follows was read:-

The Standing Committee of the Parochial Church Council with Mr Griffiths co-opted, have carefully considered the question of the condition of the Organ.

Two possible courses have been suggested:-

- (1) To put the present Organ in repair at an estimated cost of £362.
- (2) Completely to modernize it, installing tubular pneumatic action and bringing it up to date in all respects at a cost of about £2000.

Your Committee, especially in view of the fact that the case is one of the finest in the Country, do not favour the spending of nearly £400 in merely patching up the present obsolete Organ.

They are informed that the instrument will probably last for another four or five years and they recommend that the larger scheme should be adopted and carried out at the first favourable opportunity.
