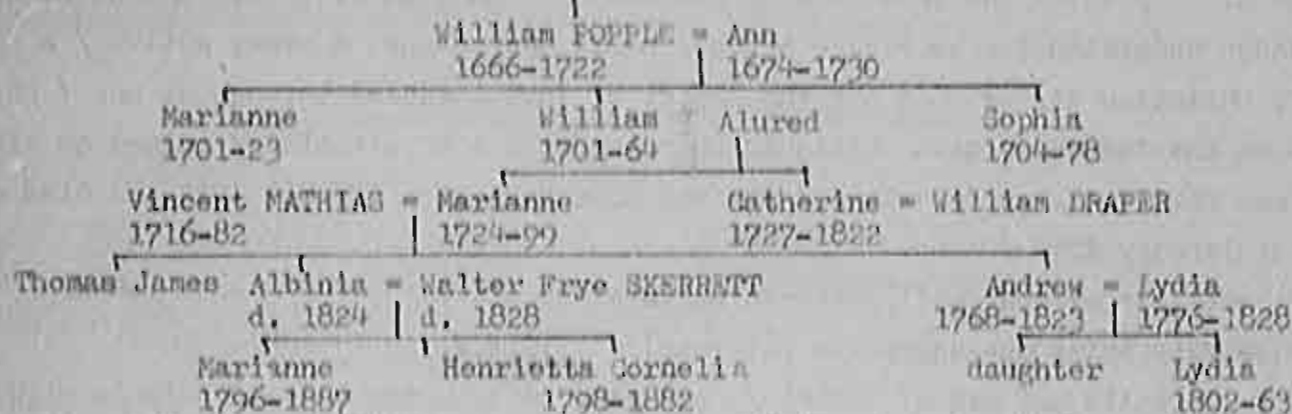

Vincent and Marianne MATHIAS are mentioned in DRB's entry for their satirist son, Thomas James. Vincent was Sub-treasurer in the Queen's Household and Treasurer of Queen Anne's Bounty. Marianne was "daughter of Alured Popple, Secretary to Board of Trade and Governor of Bermuda"

Confusingly, the DRB gives 2 Wm. POPPLEs, the elder being a merchant, an author and Secretary of Board of Trade but dying in 1708 (sic). The younger (1701-64) is Governor of Bermuda from 1745, author of mediocre plays, and grandson (sic) of the elder.

Park p. 316 says Alured (sic) Popple ("perhaps his father") was Governor of Bermuda from 1737, so it ran in the family! He also quotes the epitaph on the south side.
