

Sir James Mackintosh's portrait is in the church vestry (Koch, p. 11)

Another is in the National Portrait Gallery. Monument in Westminster Abbey.

DNB describes him as 'philosopher'.

He was also barrister, Recorder of Bombay (1804 - 6), MP for Nairn (1813) and Knaresborough (1819), and Professor of Law at Haileybury (1818 - 24).

He died at his home in Langham Place, after swallowing a chicken bone.

No local connection found, except that Sir James dined with the Longmans at Greenhill in 1819 and was a friend of Spencer Perceval.

Hensleigh Wedgwood (sic) is in the DNB; dates 1803 - 91. Called "philologist", he published first etymological dictionary (1857). He was grandson of Josiah Wedgwood of Etruria.

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Lady Catherine Mackintosh's sisters (née ALLEN) married Josiah and John Wedgwood, sons of Josiah Wedgwood of Etruria. So Hensleigh Wedgwood married his cousin
