

Park says 'this family was highly  
respected at Hampstead'. Nathaniel  
was a whig politician, appointed  
in 1727 as Surveyor of the Greenway  
Money (a form of fine).

In 1743 he married Margaret Jones of  
Covent Garden and they lived at  
Burgh House until 1758, when he became  
the 4th and last Lord Delamer.  
He then lived at Dunham Massey  
(Cheshire), where the National Trust  
guidebook now says he was an  
'unattractive man, who planted most  
of the finest trees'.
