Edward SNOXELL was in charge of part of the Manor Farm in 1703/4 and 1762 Surveys.
In 1750 he was an Overseer of the Poor. In 1762 he owned the King's Head (now
William IV) and some fields near the Bell, Kilburn. (An earlier Edw. Snoxell had
land at Chalcoth and died 1693).

Mr Armine SNOXELL also owned land in West Hampstead in 1762.

Richard HOULDITCH is known at Pond St in 1837 (Property Owners) and 1840 (Vigot)
Lyons has 2 other Richard Houlditches, dying 1736 and 1759; also Mary, daughter of
Richard Houlditch and wife of William JARMAN, died 1764; also Wm. Jarman, died 1768.

Are these 2 graves amalgamated (when the crypt room site was cleared in 1912)? Mary's
missing Lyons's entries on the missing top slab? Willard has 2 grave entries - 66 and
66a - and has crossed out (or someone else has) the 2nd John FOSTER entry; they are
the only link but differ slightly (18, and Oct. 7 on top slab, 20g and Oct. 6 on side
Nas Snoxell slab the illegible " " on Temple Moore's was?
Snoxells were farmers and called Mr. Houlditch came from Harley St and called Edw.
